

Independence Day

On Friday of last week we celebrated our freedom from Great Britain, as we commemorated the passage of the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress back on July 4th, 1776. That document, announced the separation of the 13 North American colonies from the British Crown. In 1870, the US Congress made Independence Day an unpaid holiday for federal workers, and in 1938 it became a paid federal holiday. There were the usual parades, firework displays, picnics, concerts and other festivities. Some decided to just stay at home and enjoy Bar-b-Que dinners with loved ones and friends.

The Fourth of July's commemoration always awakens a deep sense of patriotism, regardless of one's political stripes. As we look back, there is sufficient evidence to prove that political and other social movements have sought to lay claim to this celebration, not the least being the abolitionists, women's right advocates and opponents of immigration (nativists). Yet here we are celebrating the freedom that Almighty God has given us, as we strive to build a more perfect union. It must be a difficult time for those who continue to feel that the American dream is slipping away from them, (and there are many). Others who have been part of our country for decades now fear that a knock on the door could mean a deportation order or a separation from loved ones! And yes, there is that widening gap between the insanely rich and those merely getting by. I hope that we did use this observance to not only celebrate what we have become as a nation in the eyes of the world, but also took the time to focus on what we must do to make everyone feel that their contribution is appreciated, and that indeed we are truly one people under God.
